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Abstract: The abstract must not be longer than 80 words. Non-standard abbreviations and specific nomenclature of materials must be avoided.

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Does not use boldface typing or capital letters except for section headings (cf. remarks on section headings, below).

Organization of the Text. The text should include (but not limited to) the *Introduction, Methods or Materials and Methods, Results and Discussions, Conclusion* (if necessary), *Acknowledgement* (if necessary) and *References*.

Section Headings. The section headings are in boldface capital and lowercase letters. Second level headings are typed as part of the succeeding paragraph (like the subsection heading of this paragraph).

Page Numbers. Do *not* print page numbers.

Tables. Tables (refer with: Table 1, Table 2, ...) should be presented as part of the text, but in such a way as to avoid confusion with the text. A descriptive title should be placed above each table.

Special Signs. for example , $\alpha \gamma \mu \Omega$ () $\geq \pm \bullet \Gamma \{11\overline{2}0\}$ should always be written in with the fonts Times New Roman.

Figures. Figures (refer with: Fig. 1, Fig. 2, ...) also should be presented as part of the text, leaving enough space so that the caption will not be confused with the text. The caption should be self-contained and placed below the figure. Utmost care must be taken to insert the figures in correct alignment with the text.

Equations. Equations (refer with: Eq. 1, Eq. 2, ...) should be indented 5 mm (0.2"). There should be one line of space above the equation and one line of space below it before the text continues. The equations have to be numbered sequentially, and the number put in parentheses at the right-hand edge of the text. Equations

should be punctuated as if they were an ordinary part of the text. Punctuation appears after the equation but before the equation number, e.g.

$$c^2 = a^2 + b^2. {1}$$

Units: Use either SI (MKS) or CGS as primary units. (SI units are encouraged.) English units may be used as secondary units (in parentheses).

Literature References

References are cited in the text using Harvard method of citation.

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SOME COMMON MISTAKES

The word "data" is plural, not singular. The subscript for the permeability of vacuum₀ is zero, not a lowercase letter "o." In American English, periods and commas are within quotation marks, like "this period." A parenthetical statement at the end of a sentence is punctuated outside of the closing parenthesis (like this). (A parenthetical *sentence* is punctuated within the parentheses.) A graph within a graph is an "inset," not an "insert." The word alternatively is preferred to the word "alternately" (unless you mean something that alternates). Do not use the word "essentially" to mean "approximately" or "effectively." Be aware of the different meanings of the homophones "affect" and "effect," "complement" and "compliment," "discreet" and "discrete," "principal" and "principle." Do not confuse "imply" and "infer." The prefix "non" is not a word; it should be joined to the word it modifies, usually without a hyphen. There is no period after the "et" in the Latin abbreviation "et al." The abbreviation "i.e." means "that is," and the abbreviation "e.g." means "for example." An excellent style manual for writers is [7].

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
